Please pray for Peter Sykes' brother Mark as he is in the hospital for a leg amputation. Please also pray for the UCC colleagues Tony Kill and Karen Fritz, who lost their house in a fire on Thursday night. Please hold in your prayers three Muslim students, Deah Shaddy Barakat, 23; his wife, Yusor Mohammad Abu-Salha, 21; and her sister Razan Mohammad Abu-Salha, 19, who were murdered this week in Chapel Hill, and for the Muslim community, as officials investigate the motivation behind the killings. We lift up in prayer those most affected by this week's record snowfalls, particularly those with physical disabilities and those without adequate shelter. Please keep in your prayers our nation as we continue to work towards peace and racial justice in cities across the country. We pray for all those directly impacted by the violent threat and reality posed by ISIS, Al Queda, and Boko Haram, and by ongoing turmoil in the Ukraine, Israel, Palestine and throughout the region. We pray also that God's wisdom and peace be a prevailing guide for us and for our nation's political and military leaders. As we prepare for the Lenten season which, among other things, invites us to face our mortality, we are excited to announce a new partnership between the Conversation Project and Greater Boston Interfaith Organization, of which First Church is a part. Started by the well-known writer Ellen Goodman, the Conversation Project is an award winning project, the goal of which is to have everyone's wishes for care through the end of life expressed and respected. How we die is part of our legacy to our loved ones and our communities. Most Americans express the hope that as they near the end of their lives they will not be a burden for their families and friends. Yet, if we avoid having values-centered conversations about our unique hopes and wishes for care through the end of life, we may be leaving family members in the dark. This omission may result in strife at the bedside and cause lasting damage in the relationships between the people we love the most. This workshop, led by the Rev. Rosemary Lloyd, Advisor to Faith-Based Communities for The Conversation Project and a leader in GBIO, will introduce participants to The Starter Kit. The Boston Warm Day Center at Old South Church is open! The atmosphere has been peaceful. Guests have rested, read, slept, chatted. We've gone through a lot of coffee and snacks! And we've filled 60 storage lockers with people's possessions, so far. This is a HUGE service we've been able to offer to those who otherwise would have to carry all of their possessions with them to doctor's appointments, job interviews, and work, and people have been so thankful for it. If that weren't enough, the Boston Warm Day Center at Emmanuel Church opens this Monday! So, we need your help...

Donations: Financial resources are critical. With your \$43 donation, we can purchase a storage bin (\$40) and a padlock (\$3), where those people displaced from Long Island can store their belongings. You can literally take some weight off of another person's shoulders. Address checks to: City Mission Society, 14 Beacon Street, #203, Boston MA 02108 with *Boston Warm* on the memo line.

Material needs: Boston Warm day centers are in need of the following material donations:

- ◆ **Food:** sandwiches, hard-boiled eggs, fruit, baked goods, granola bars and other non-perishable snacks, juice boxes, canned food with pop-top lids.
- ◆ **Bulk Items:** ground coffee, sugar packets, coffee cups, plates, napkins, wet wipes.
- ◆ Water cooler water jugs.
- ◆ Pillowcases and fleece blankets for the nap room.
- ◆ \$5.00 CharlieCards to help guests get to appointments and job interviews
- ◆ Hygiene kits (in ziploc bags, containing items like soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, washcloth, deodorant, comb, shampoo, tissues, hand sanitizers, feminine hygiene products.
- ◆ Socks, and warm hats, gloves, mittens, and scarves.
