# **First Church Land Acknowledgment**



# TRANSITION AT FIRST CHURCH

# This "Interim" Time at First Church

The purpose of an interim, or transitional, time in a congregation is for the church to prepare itself for new pastoral leadership. Given the importance of pastoral leadership in a congregation, the goal of the transitional time is to lay the groundwork for a good, healthy, faithful, and "successful" tenure by the next leader. This preparation involves looking inward at ourselves, our systems, priorities, patterns in the



exercise of power, resources, and hopes. It also involves looking outward at the context in which we now live and serve. As summarized by the Southern New England Conference, three sets of questions are central to the work of this transitional time:



- Who are we (our skills, character, assets, resources, gifts, and historical trends and DNA)?
- In today's ever (and rapidly) changing landscape, who is our neighbor (around the community, and commuter radius, and around the world)? What are their burdens, dreams, longings and strivings, spiritual needs, challenges, fears, struggles?
- And given the answer to the first two questions, what is God uniquely calling us to become and to do in this current time and place?

That's the big picture of the work we are already doing together. While there is always a good deal of foundational pastoral work involved (care, worship leadership, staff leadership, problem solving, etc.), we can envision three facets of this transitional work:

Relationships and Information
Congregational Discovery
Active Search

# Advent Art: Twelve Feasts & Festivals Sunday, December 1, Hastings Common





Unveiling of Native Spaces:
Indigenous Street Signs Project
Friday, November 29, 2:00 - 3:00 p.m.
Third and Binney Streets, East Cambridge

Members of the Massachusett tribe and The City of Cambridge will unveil newly installed street signs in East Cambridge that are presented in both the Massachusett and English languages.



With the goal of expanding recognition of Indigenous Peoples in Cambridge, the community voted through the City of Cambridge's Participatory Budgeting (PB) process to fund a series of markers and signs that acknowledge the continuous presence of Native Peoples, both before and after white settlement, and to educate residents and visitors about their lives and traditions. The first phase of this PB project was to translate the numbered street names in East Cambridge into the Massachusett language and install new street signs from First to Eighth streets. A dedicated City of Cambridge website will also introduce the project and serve as a landing page for future project elements and programming.

This event will include remarks from local Indigenous advocates and representatives with the City, an unveiling of the street signs, and a group photo opportunity. All are invited to attend. In the event of poor weather, the alternate location will be held indoors at The Foundry building at 101 Rogers Street.

The event location is accessible via the MBTA's Red Line and the Kendall Square Station. Interpreters will be available upon advanced request.
