COMMUNITY PRAYERS

- We pray for Kate Layzer and her family as they mourn the loss of Kate's mother Anne, who died peacefully last week.
- We pray for Jeff, Nathan, and Peter Wilson-Braun, their extended family and friends, and all of us who are mourning the loss of Carol Wilson-Braun, who died on November 24, after a clear-eyed and courageous battle with ALS.
- We pray for Susie Neubauer, her family, and all of us who are mourning the loss of Perry Neubauer, who died on November 13 after a brief but difficult illness.
- We pray for all who are living with significant health challenges and their families and caregivers: Ellen Frith, who is living with a serious chronic illness; Poppy Coffin, who is experiencing Alzheimer's Disease; Carter West, who is experiencing a chronic neurological disorder; and Keith Manville, who has atypical Parkinsonism. We pray for the dead, for their loved ones, and for their broader communities. We pray for changed hearts for all those inflicting violence upon others, and thus upon their own souls. We give thanks for the peacemakers. We pray that we, like they, may be free of the myth of redemptive violence, and take collective action, however small, to be people of true peace in this world.
- We continue to pray for those most affected by changes in reproductive rights: for all those struggling with the moral and political complexities of pregnancy and childbearing, and for

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

An Update from the Campaign

Many, many thanks to all who have shared their pledge or intention for giving for 2025.

As of December 15, we are 67% towards our goal of \$751,000!

Of the 93 pledges/intentions received so far:

- 9 are from newcomers
- 58 are from people who pledged last year, with an average increase of 19%
- 26 are from people who have pledged or given previously, but had not pledged last year

Pledging or sharing your intentions is a great help to the Stewardship and Finance Committees, so that we can continue to plan wisely.



If you haven't yet shared your financial intention for 2025, we invite you to be "wildly generous" – to stretch and deepen your giving as we each share our commitment to this next year together. You may make your 2025 Stewardship Pledge online, or by mailing your pledge card to the church, placing it in the offering plate next Sunday, or emailing Karen McArthur. There are extra pledge cards on the tables at the back of the Sanctuary and by Hastings Common.

Even as we focus on our commitments for 2025, it is equally important that we fulfill our commitments for 2024. As was reported at the Fall Congregational Meeting, we are dealing with a deficit of around \$35,000 for 2024, which was based on us being able to meet our budgeted amount of pledges and gifts for this year. As of now, **the shortfall in pledges and gifts is \$121,000.** If this amount is not raised, the deficit will increase and require tapping our investments for the balance. Keeping the deficit as small as possible is critical for us to start 2025 on solid financial ground.

So, please do everything you can to fulfill your pledge for this year, and for those who make end of year gifts, please be as generous as possible. If you have questions about your pledge balance, please <u>contact Karen</u>.


Young Adults: Faith on Tap
