



COMMUNITY PRAYERS

- We pray for Ami Brenner and her family as they mourn the loss of Ami's father Jim Rae, who died of cardiac arrest on December 28.

- We pray for the family of the 21-year-old man killed in an act of gun violence on a street in North Cambridge, and we pray for all those in the neighborhood who are managing their responses to such a traumatic event.
- We pray for all those impacted by wildfires in southern California, and we continue to pray for our earth and all creation in the face of the climate crisis.
- We pray for our nation as we prepare for the transition to a new administration. We pray for a peaceful transfer of power. We pray also for all those who are experiencing anxiety about potential changes to how our federal government will legislate on the rights and freedoms of a variety of groups, including immigrants, trans and gender non-conforming people, and people facing decisions about their reproductive rights. We continue to pray for strength as we find ways to resist evil and act justly in this world.
- We pray with thanksgiving for news of a ceasefire in Gaza, where thousands have died in the tragic war that began in October 2023. We pray that the agreement to end the violence is a lasting one, and we pray for all who will try to rebuild their lives in Gaza.
- We pray for our neighbors all over the world. Especially we pray for all whose lives are affected by political upheaval and war around the globe. We pray for the dead, for their loved ones, and for their broader communities. We pray for changed hearts for all those inflicting violence upon others, and thus upon their own souls. We give thanks for the peacemakers. We pray that we, like they, may be free of the myth of redemptive violence, and take collective action, however small, to be people of true peace in this world.
- We pray for the 14 men finding sustenance and protection in our First Church Shelter; and we pray for the guests of the Friday Café, who are finding resources and listening ears.

Teens and chaperones will meet at First Church at 1:00 p.m. to drive to Jamaica Plain.


Martin Luther King Day Commemoration and Remembrance Monday, January 20 at 11:00 a.m.
