INTRODUCING OUR NEW MEMBERS

We welcomed these six new members in covenant last Sunday.

Peter Byerly has participated in the life of First Church for several decades and is now making his membership official. He is a retired architect living in Boston. Peter is from a small town, but came to the city years ago for college (Philadelphia) and architecture school (Cambridge) and stayed in cities. He lives near a river now and loves it.
